The technology world allowed me to interact with students and student work electronically from Las Vegas and San Diego while on NEA assignment throughout January. Thanks Google. Every step of the way, I was reminded of the incredible importance of this amazing process.

While I won't know for a while if I recertified, it was once again incredible simply to go through the process which continues to inform my advocacy work for educators and students. Also, as the first NBCT elected at the national level, I take very seriously my responsibility to the National Boards and my fellow NBCTs.

The Teacher Leadership Initiative (TLI) is a collaboration among the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards, the Center for Teacher Quality, and the National Education Association. This initiative supports emerging teacher leaders as they examine overarching teacher leadership competencies in addition to competencies in association leadership, instructional leadership, and policy leadership. All TLI candidates complete a capstone project, in which they examine their growth on the competencies they select as they address a real issue in their educational context. For Teachers, By Teachers

You might be wondering what has taken so long to get to this point! Thousands of National Board Certified Teachers (NBCTs) and other practicing educators contributed to the design, development, scoring, and standard setting for the redesigned National Board Certification assessment. The rigorous process of setting the performance standard for certification involves examining candidate work on all four components of the assessment, something that couldn't happen until this summer when we had scored submissions for *Component 4: Effective and Reflective Practitioner*.

As part of this process, we conducted 38 standard setting studies with 271 Board-certified teachers across the United States to help set the National Board performance standards across 25 certificate areas and the specialties within them. With careful planning and execution by our psychometric and assessment team, and with close and careful stewardship by our Technical Advisory Group, this was a tremendous undertaking that required and has since received full review and approval by the Certification Council and NBPTS Board of Directors. As a result, we're pleased to share that the assessment results have established evidence of reliability, validity, and fairness. We're proud of this feat, one we've been working towards for more than three years!

While waiting for more information on the performance standard for certification, we encourage you to re-review the scoring rubrics (found in the <u>certificate-specific instructions</u>), which describe the quality of evidence required for accomplishment.

As mentioned earlier, we plan to provide an update on the total weighted scaled score by November 6. Work is currently underway to update the Scoring Guide with new information and sample score reports. The updated Scoring Guide and other resources will be available by early December. Similar to previous years, we can only say at this point that scores will be released on or before December 31, but we commit to notifying you as soon as we can confirm the score release date.

In closing, we thank you again for your patience as we near the end of the redesign process. It's been a long process, but one tended to with the highest quality and greatest expertise. As a result, we are excited and confident that soon, we will successfully certify the first class of NBCTs in the redesigned process. Until then, expect us to provide new information as it becomes available, with the next communication scheduled for November 6.
